FOREWORD TO THE CROM SERIES

A four-book archive of the Casablanca Republic of Morocco



This volume is one of four bound records that together form the working archive of the Casablanca Republic of Morocco — a compact library kept by the Council of Private Law for its Native Moors, its officers, and its posterity.

The White Book holds the Chancellery Master Archive: the inviolable private registry of members and the sovereign records of allegiance, birth, and merit.

The Gold Book is the Moorish Education Manual: the curriculum by which nationality is restored and the Codex of Culture is transmitted from elder to student.

The Green Book is the Council of Commerce & Private Treasury: the private banking and monetary codex under which trade, tribute, and the treasury are ordered.

The Blue Book is the Official Administrative Manual: the operational infrastructure by which the Republic conducts its lawful business day to day.

Read together, these four books answer four questions in turn — who we are, how we are taught, how we exchange value, and how we govern. Read separately, each stands on its own as a working reference. In every case the contents are authoritative and are not to be edited outside the Chancellery.

COURSE 1: NATIONALITY & IDENTITY SOVEREIGNTY CORE (4 WEEKS)

- Week 1: Etymology of Classification and Linguistic Seclusion.

- o Topic: Unmasking colonial descriptors.

- o Syllabus: Deconstruction of the legal, commercial, and

psychological effects of public municipal terms (e.g., "Black," "Negro," "Colored," "African-American"). Exploration of how these

terms signify civil death (*civiliter mortuus*) in corporate state registries. Introduction to ancestral designations: Moor, Moorman, Moorish, and the Lineage of Judah.

- Week 2: Ancestral Matrilineal and Patrilineal Genealogies.

- o Topic: Tracing the foundational mother-cultures.

- o Syllabus: Mapping the ancient migrations and territorial

boundaries of the Olmec Moors, Washitaw Moors, Lenape Moors, Yamasee Moors, and allied bands. Verifying bloodline connections to the land base of the continent.

- Week 3: The Private Membership Association (PMA) Standing.

- o Topic: Shifting from public tracking to private assembly.

- o Syllabus: The operational layout of moving personal and family

profiles completely inside a private domain. The mechanics of the Settlers Agreement and Membership Compact. Understanding how private common-law contracts supersede state public regulations.

- Week 4: Execution of the Oath of Allegiance.

- o Topic: Formalizing tribal naturalization.

- o Syllabus: The completion, sealing, and recordation of the Oath of

Allegiance and Bloodline Bond. Updating the internal master database managed by the Council of Vital Statistics. Issuance of the initial tribal membership credentials.

COURSE 2: CIVICS, STATUS, AND JURISDICTIONAL BOUNDARIES (4

WEEKS)

- Week 5: The Dual System Architecture (Public vs. Private).

- o Topic: Dissecting corporate governance structures.

- o Syllabus: Contrast between municipal state/federal statutory

corporations (public legal fictions formatted in ALL-CAPITAL LETTERS) and natural flesh-and-blood sovereign beings operating within common law.

- Week 6: Non-Resident Alien Capacity & Tax Exemption.

- o Topic: Establishing foreign non-municipal status.

- o Syllabus: Structural study of status as a non-resident alien, non-

citizen, and non-municipal national. Step-by-step breakdown of how this standing interfaces with federal reporting systems to assert financial immunity.

- Week 7: The Private Fee Schedule and Contractual Consent.

- o Topic: Monetizing administrative trespass.

- o Syllabus: The legal theory behind performance-based contracts.

How to properly serve the Private Fee Schedule Acknowledgment Receipt to municipal agents (police, assessors, code enforcers) to capture personal liability for unauthorized interaction.

- Week 8: Inter-Agency Coordination and Sharif Protocol.

- o Topic: Managing field encounters.

- o Syllabus: Behavioral training for members during municipal stops.

Mastering the verbal scripts and presentation methods for the Notice of Special Consular Standing. How to deploy Deputy Sharifs to secure property boundaries.

COURSE 3: CONSTITUTIONAL ARCHITECTURE & TREATY ENFORCEMENT (4 WEEKS)

o Syllabus: Line-by-line reading of the 1786 Treaty. Understanding

consular jurisdiction, commercial immunity across open waters and land boundaries, and how it governs interactions with corporate state entities.

- Week 11: The Act of Algeciras (1906) & Economic Liberty.

o Topic: Multi-lateral treaty frameworks for commerce.

o Syllabus: The historical background and legal mechanics of the

Algeciras Conference. Applying its open-trade and custom-free barter principles to the operations of CROM Holdings Series LLC and its regional cells.

- Week 12: Drafting the Sovereign Constitutional Extract.

o Topic: Presenting supreme law to the public record.

o Syllabus: The composition and assembly of the Sovereign

Constitutional Declaration and Extract. How to package this document inside your master transmittal packets for public filing.

COURSE 4: INTERNATIONAL LAW, UNDRIP, & GLOBAL REPOSITORIES (4

WEEKS)

- Week 13: Inherent Sovereignty vs. Granted Rights.

o Topic: Deconstructing the international human rights model.

o Syllabus: Understanding that self-determination is an inherent,

un-alienable quality of indigenous groups, not a privilege granted by municipal states or the UN General Assembly.

- Week 14: The United Nations Declaration on the Rights of

- Indigenous Peoples.

o Topic: Weaponizing UNDRIP for domestic insulation.

o Syllabus: Deep focus on Articles 3, 4, 5, 11, and 37. Codifying

autonomy over internal and local affairs, distinct economic institutions, and ancestral resource conservation.

- Week 15: Executing the Affidavit of Invocation.

o Topic: Formalizing international notices.

o Syllabus: Complete construction of the Affidavit of Invocation of

UNDRIP. Formatting point-for-point claims to establish a clear public international record.

- Week 16: Establishing Electronic Portals and Transmission Logs.

o Topic: Secure uploading to international registries.

o Syllabus: The technical and administrative steps to format,

cryptographically hash (SHA-256), and log digital submissions into the permanent repositories of the United Nations (OHCHR) and global chancellery clearinghouses.

PART II: THE K–12 CONTINUOUS EDUCATIONAL ACADEMY SYSTEM

K-12 PROGRESSIVE ACADEMICS

Primary (Pre-K - Grade 2): Language, Etymology, & Physical Geography Intermediate
(Grades 3 - 5): Ancestral Mapping & Fundamental Ledger

Middle School (Grades 6 - 8): Constitutional History & Applied Materials High School
(Grades 9 - 12): Contract Coding, Li-Fi Systems, & Advanced Law

PRIMARY LEVEL: PRE-KINDERGARTEN THROUGH GRADE 2

- Core Objectives: Mastery of natural vocal projection, fundamental literacy, foundational etymology, and the physical identification of land forms.
- Pre-K: Phonics, reading comprehension using natural texts, identifying geometric shapes in native architectures, vocal control exercises for addressing authority figures.
- Kindergarten: Introduction to family tree charting, distinguishing between original land names and colonial municipal designations, introduction to the math of physical weights (gold and silver scales).
- Grade 1: Etymology of names, reading and writing exercises focused on native animal and plant species, tracing the physical outlines of original maps.
- Grade 2: Basic counting in Private Exchange Units (PEUs), writing personal declarations of truth, physical geographic surveys of local water features and soils.

- INTERMEDIATE LEVEL: GRADES 3 THROUGH 5

- Core Objectives: Structural grammar, ancestral historiography,
- fundamental ledger accounting, and ecological life sciences.
- Grade 3: Structural reading of historical contracts, study of the Olmec
- Moor mother-culture, addition and subtraction matrices using physical weights of silver specie.
- Grade 4: Compiling the family genealogy record back four generations,
- reading the simplified versions of early peace treaties, basic woodworking, and structural shelter drafting.
- Grade 5: Introduction to double-entry private bookkeeping,
- etymological dissection of municipal statutory codes, soil mechanics, and organic agricultural crop rotation tracking.

- MIDDLE SCHOOL LEVEL: GRADES 6 THROUGH 8

- Core Objectives: Advanced civics, mechanical engineering,
- constitutional analysis, and localized material gathering.
- Grade 6: Comprehensive study of the United States Constitution
- (focusing on Article I), drafting the Notice of Home-Education Outpost, introductory physics, and mapping localized light paths.
- Grade 7: Analyzing the 1786 Moroccan-American Treaty, identifying and
- reclaiming solid waste items (old tires, scraps) for material conversion, blueprint architecture for housing clusters.
- Grade 8: Complete mastery of the Private Fee Schedule mechanics,
- historical study of the Tribe of Judah and Moorish alliances, introductory chemistry for basic construction adhesives and binders.

• HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL: GRADES 9 THROUGH 12

▢ Core Objectives: Advanced Jurisprudence, Blockchain Tokenomics, Optical Communications, and Industrial Manufacturing.

▢ Grade 9 (The Sovereign Junior): Full textual analysis of UNDRIP, coding and deploying simple smart contracts via Solidity, physical assembly of solar- powered battery arrays.

▢ Grade 10 (The Jurisconsultus Apprentice): Drafting formal affidavits, summonses, and commercial invoices. Practical training in chemical shredding and processing of vulcanized tires to manufacture Aboriginal Asphalt.

▢ Grade 11 (The Consular Technician): Advanced optical networking physics: wiring, testing, and installing LED drivers and photodetector panels for secure, enclosed Li-Fi Networks. Managing regional sub-series LLC ledgers.

▢ Grade 12 (The Tribal Administrator Capstone): Complete production of a Master Diplomatic Stack filing. Executing simulated field operations with the Chief Sharif. Defense of land boundaries via the Consular Court system. Graduation requires a successful oral defense of their Schedule A Property Recordation before the High Council.
